ORDINARY TIME

Each of the five Sundays in June celebrated a solemnity of the liturgical year (Ascension, Pentecost, Holy Trinity, Corpus Christi and Sts. Peter & Paul).

As a result, the Church in the U.S. hasn't celebrated a Sunday in Ordinary Time since March 2nd.

What does "Ordinary Time: mean during the liturgical year. Too often the word "ordinary" is used to describe something that can be routine, mundane or boring.

The word ordinary in "Ordinary Time" refers to the listing or ordinal or sequential numbers.

This is what is meant by the 14th Sunday in ordinary time.

The Liturgical year is made up of Advent, Christmas, Lent and Easter seasons. The term "Ordinary Time" refers to the order of Sundays in the church year that do not fall into major seasons.

Ordinary Time consists of 33 or 34 weeks and is divided into two parts. Ordinary Time begins the Monday following the Sunday after January 6th, and continues until the beginning of Lent. It then begins again on the Monday after Pentecost and ends on the Saturday before the First Sunday of Advent.

The liturgical year is about growing in relationship with Jesus Christ. The scripture proclaimed during Ordinary Time reveals the teaching and mission of Jesus Christ, allowing us to better understand God, who became human.

Ordinary Time, from now into late November should be anything but boring or monotonous. There are the days where we grow into who we are called to be in our relationship with Christ.

SOUTH JERSEY CATHOLIC MINISTRIES

This year our parish's goal was \$45,600.00. It is less than last year because Bishop Sullivan decided to give every parish in the Diocese at 17.7% of ordinary income in honor of the Jubilee.

Our parish will receive 10% of the goal and then 100% of the pledges over the goal.

As of June 30th, we have surpassed \$55,000.00, (120.6 %) from 69 families! Remember that our parish will receive 10% of goal (\$4,560.00) and 100% of all pledges that are paid over the goal.

There are many open weekday masses available. If you would like to celebrate an occasion or memorialize a loved one by requesting a Mass intention, please contact the Rectory Office.


Cost is \$15.00 per mass announced and \$10.00 per mass for un-announced intentions.



July 4th: Blessed Pier Georgio Frassati

Pier Georgio was born in 1901, in Turin, Italy. His parents and extended family were wealthy. At an early age, Pier Georgio was dedicated to receiving the Eucharist daily. He would hike up a mountain from his family's home to attend Mass each day. He was active in helping the poor and got his friends to help. He was deeply spiritual.

At 24 years old he contracted polio and died on July 4, 1925. At his funeral, all of the important people of Turin's society were in the Cathedral and hundreds of the poor stood outside. The cause for his sainthood began in 1932 when the poor of Turin wrote a letter to the Archbishop. Blessed Pier Georgio will be canonized on September 7th by Pope Leo XIV.



July 11th: St. Benedict – Abbot

St. Benedict (480-550AD), father of Western monasticsm and patron saint of Europe, attracted people by his spiritual life. He wrote a practical rule of life.

This guide for their life of prayer and work and community is still in use by the Benedictines today. "Treat each visitor like Christ. Our common rule in life is the Gospel".
